This Data Book is the third edition published by the New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD), in collaboration with our sister agencies to form the first **Health and Human Services Data Book**. This section provides comparable information and statistics across a range of demographic and socioeconomic indicators, as well as information related to community resources.

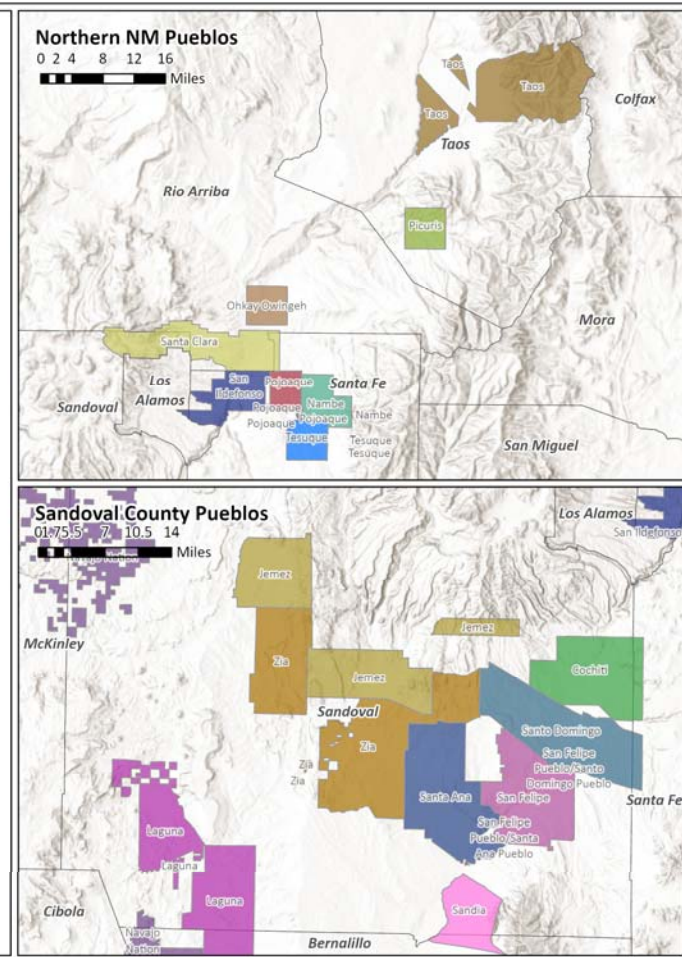
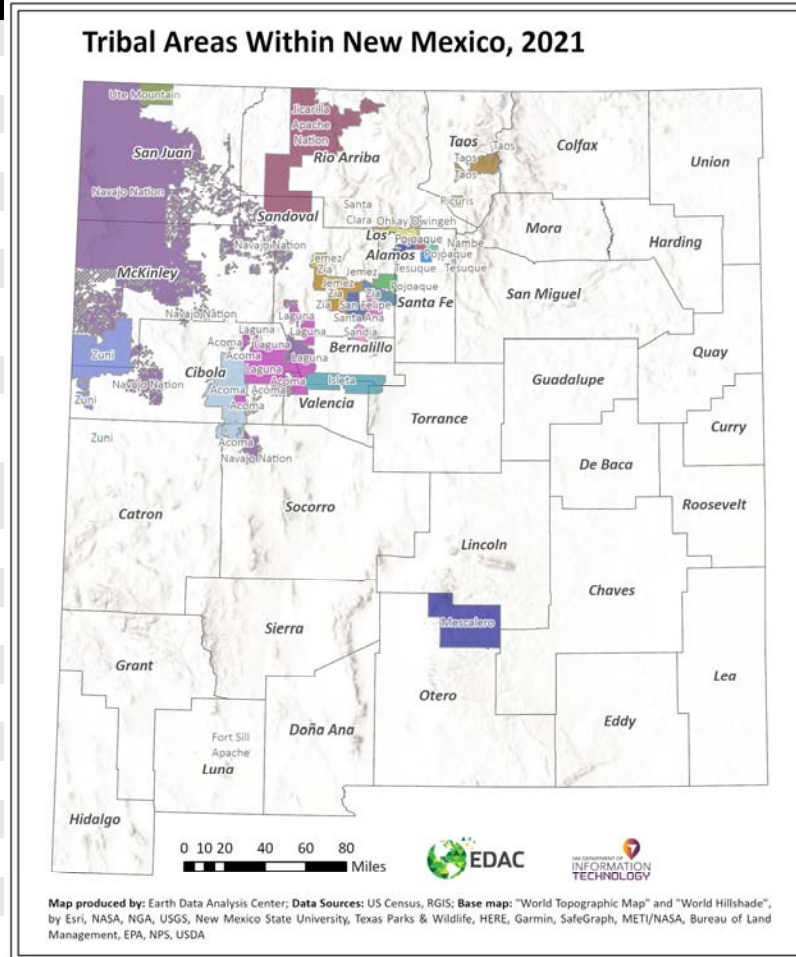
## REFERENCE
