Having trouble affording groceries?

SNAP may be able to help!



SNAP provides monthly benefits on an EBT card that you can use to buy food at grocery stores, farmers markets, and other locations. Low-income students between the ages of 18 and 49 who are **enrolled half-time or more*** in higher education may be eligible if they meet any of the following:

- Work at least 20 hours per week
- Have a disability
- Have a child under 12
- In a state or federally funded work study program
- Enrolled half-time or more in a career or technical certificate/associate degree program (e.g. HVAC Associate Degree Program)
- Participate in an on-the-job training program, work incentive program, or Employment and Training Program (E&T)

****Students who are enrolled less than half-time or who are 17 or younger OR 50 or older are not considered students for SNAP purposes.***

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Nondiscrimination Statement:

The letter must contain the complainant's name, address, telephone number, and a written description of the alleged discriminatory action in sufficient detail to inform the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights (ASCR) about the nature and date of an alleged civil rights violation.
